


How Much Are We Driving?

Sonoma County Weekday Daily Vehicle Miles Traveled (1990 - 1995)

In Sonoma County, between 1990 and 1995, the average weekday daily Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) increased 14% and the average VMT per person increased 7% (from 17.0 to 18.1 per person).

Nationwide between 1969 and 1990, VMT per person increased from 3.9 miles to 5.9 miles. The number of vehicles increased 6 times faster than the population did. Sonoma County's VMT per person in 1990 was almost three times (300%) greater than the national average. (Sources: Sonoma County figures are from: Metropolitan Transportation Commission. Santa Rosa Tomorrow - Take Your Choice

Even small population growth rates can lead to very high populations in a relatively short period of time.

Below is a chart that shows the size that Santa Rosa would become in 70 years if it grows at what are fairly small growth rates. Calculations start with Santa Rosa's current (1999) population of 138,742. (Chart modelled after chart on p. 106 of Better Not Bigger.)
